There are discussions underway concerning amending the ordinance to better accommodate amateur radio. A good turnout would improve our chances considerably. Fulton is the last Metro Atlanta county with restrictive ordinances.

Changing the law requires timing, and the timing is right for a change in Fulton County. They took a drubbing with Dale Heatherington and want to get out of the process. We have support of the inspections department.

It doesn't matter where you live, DeKalb turned out to help Cobb, Atlanta turned out to help DeKalb, no one much turned out to help Atlanta, and now YOU need to help to win the last of the area counties.

President's Column - de W8BLA

Presidents Column Nov. 1991 SEDX

Happy Thanksgiving to everyone. The thought of stuffing ourselves with turkey or other traditional fare gives way to the thought of what we all seem to have been doing recently with the overstuffing of DX.

I began a project in February, 1989, with the end being to put up as much paper on the shack wall as possible. (DXCC, WAZ, CQ DX SSB, CQ DX CW, etc.) Start with an empty computer and a log book and see what can be accomplished in a two and one-half year term. Track the cost of the qsl cards, postage, envelopes, bureau envelopes and other trivials. Thanks to XZ, ZA, 3Y, and many other dxpeditions it made the task somewhat easier.

The cycle also has done a tremendous amount to complete the task. The final results of the test are now available and to my surprise are pretty substantial.

297 countries 287 confirmed (still waiting for the exotic cards from Bahamas, Uruguay and the like! HI...)

Awards: DXCC (275), WPS, WAZ Mixed, WAZ SSB, WAC phone, WAC cw, WAZ 15 CW, WAZ 15 SSB, and still working on the 5 Band DXCC, confirmed totals for each band currently sufficient to meet requirements except for 80 meters, and 160.

Costs: 12.73 per qsl for the 287 confirmations, reduced to 4.61 per card for the multiple award category. To work the stations required for the various awards, and to send most of the cards via the bureau would have reduced the cost to 3.92 per card for those qsos that would not go via bureau. Since the idea was awards in the shortest period to qualify, the cards were obviously necessary.

I feel stuffed with good dx, at times...more than could be worked at one time, and still going strong. Sound Sandwich, Peter I looks good, Kernadec, Heard, more Bangladesh, etc. etc...did not get to honor roll in the time allotted, but sure did get close! Thanks to all that helped in the qsling process. I received advice from such notable as VK9NS, VP2MA,

VP2ML, 3W3RR, W4FRU and many others that made the qsl return success rate more positive than I ever envisioned. Sounds like a good program for the future club meetings, QSL SUCCESS, and how to get that card fast! Never could figure out why speed was important, until one day I got a package of cards from the 8 land bureau, with cards dating back to 1979! Guess the other bureaus are not as good as we like to think.

DX Tidbits

I want to thank Val, N4RJ, for putting on a great program last month. I have heard several hams say that their awareness of the impact of antenna height has been "heightened" as well as why the bands do the screwy things they do. John, KI4XO, noticed this during one of the pileups during CQWW, my lower beam actually seem to work better than his taller tower at that particular time, band, and heading. (Sorry, John!) An understanding of propagation will help you in the chase. A good example of the range of band conditions was the excellent 10 and 15 meter propagation during CQWW followed by a tremendous solar flare right afterwards. Quite a difference! Hope you had a chance to work Val and the gang at P40T during CQWW. There were some very interesting people on during the contest, XT, S, ST, 5U, 5V, TT, TZ, 3D2, OH, JD1, and KG4 to name a few. Hope you were able to grab a couple.

In January, 1992, Bill Jay, K4KG, will talk to us concerning the DXpacketcluster. (Due to Zoning Meeting) Bill operates one of the major hubs, K4KG (144.91), that, along with W1UA (145.61), and W8ZF (145.63), make up the northern Georgia network. There are many good ways to use the cluster and a few bad habits. Bill will try to help us get the maximum out of the cluster. This is very important during contests where the larger number of users can grind the system almost to a halt. Not the time to browse bulletins!

My own story of how helpful the cluster can be is during CQWW. I saw that I had copied 5U7M down as 5V7M early in the contest after seeing it on the cluster, thinking I had Togo. Much later, I ran across 5U7M and worked him on a different band. I thought that the calls were too similar so I sent a SH/DX 5U command. A 5U7M was shown at the time and band I worked the "5V7M." To see if Togo had been on, I sent a SH/DX 5V and the system showed 3 spots, one of which was only 5 minutes old! Needless to say, I quickly QSYed and worked the real 5V in a hurry. Without packet, I may have not been able to recover from my error.

Many of the other features include not only searching by prefix, but also by band. You can even specify how many spots you want to see. It can tell you beam headings, QSL info, as well as the usual PBBS type functions such as E-mail, bulletins, etc. The cluster is a tool, it's up to you how well you use it.

Hello again this month I accepted the VP's request for his article to precede mine.... Oh well no accounting for taste (hi Rick). The month has been good to all of us .. Most notably the club should do very well with the scores in the CQWW Phone contest.

A contester is born!

Yes, I even broke down and contested for the first time in my entire ham life. Said I would never do it but once into the contest I had a great time.

It was about 1 am in the morning of the contest and the radios were cold and lonely as we arrived home from a Halloween party and I quickly changed into my contest attire. Little did I realize I would wear the same attire for the next two days. The radios warmed up and the bands seemed kinda poor as I checked propagation. Lots of stations on and I began dashing about here and there working 160 meters(not much there) and 10 meters down to 80 and back up again. Notice that the clock indicated I was starting about 4 to 5 hours later than anyone else so I knew my score would be low for a first time attempt. Decided at the last minute to work multi band single operator no packet, unassisted. (That was my first of many mistakes, missed a couple of zones because of that). My second mistake was to forget all that I knew of propagation.

Well the radios and amp got hotter and the Heil headset worked great and the points kept coming in but I never could seem to get the multipliers per contact up to 2x. Sometimes during the 2nd morning of the contest it came to me in a flash "Dummy you need to work all countries and all zones everywhere" Well I finally got to see a the 2x multiplier pop up in the CT software scoring window and the second realization hit me. You need MILLIONS of points to make the multipliers really count.....This seemed to occur about the time I was seeing four VFOs and two microphones and my batteries had just about ran out. Oh well better luck next year.

Worked a lot of neat stations. Actually worked DXCC on 10 meters and had a decent score (or so the experienced contesters tell me) of 755,220. Yes the FT1000 really does work well, dual receive in one radio is tops and I retract every thing I every said about having two radios vs one. The system to get now is the Alpha 78 and do it right next year.... Hmmm maybe 10 or 20 acres too and a few more towers Hmmm see ya'll in the pileups.

Lets hope that everyone turns in their scores to CQWW with the SEDX club on their results. Remember no score is too small(or too big). I intend to work in the CW CQWW contest and see how it goes. Below are the scores I have received so far from fellow club contesters.

1. The first ARRL approved DXCC field checker in the US was appointed and Mr. Neil Foster, KC4MJ has the distinction of being able to check first time submissions in the field for the DXCC awards. More on this topic at a later date.

2. A presentation of the costs for the 1992 Marriot DX Club and Awards banquet was covered. To date only one person

has responded to the President's request for discussion and recommendations. The costs are as follows:

Room to seat 50 to 70 people will cost \$7.50 each with dinner buffet at \$15.00 each. Minimum for room is 25 dinners. \$50 for a bar, \$25 for the cashier, if \$150 in drinks sold bar charges will be covered. SEDX club stands a \$500 exposure if no one shows up. Based on this information the President, Mr. Fowler is recommending that we cancel the idea of a banquet since not many people seem to be interested in it at this time. Please bring this item up at the next meetings if you feel otherwise.

3. The information on the Voice Annunciator repeater for the DX frequency was covered and we voted to spend the matching funds of \$147.50 to get the unit and have it on the air. Last work from K4DLI (Jim) (hope I got it right) was the unit is expected to arrive in about 2 weeks. The manufacturer is getting new boards and will ship shortly.

4. A motion to examine the S2 for matching funds on the most wanted list will be checked against the priorities to see if it is in the top 50. This past issue of DX Bulletining has a list of the most needed DXCC countries. I recommend we examine it at the next club meeting and use it as the guideline for the most needed to send matching funds. This would be excluding the ZA and a few recent locations that have recently been worked.

5. Last, the application sheet needs to state that family membership is an additional \$5.00 per member in the club.

The Ohio/Penn Dx Packet Cluster

DX Bulletin No. 035 (OPDX.035)

Thanks to the Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society, Northern Ohio DX Association, Ohio/Penn Packet Cluster Network, K4CEF & the Southeastern Cluster Group, K3BEQ, WB3LHD, WK3N, K4ADK, N4DDK, N8BJQ, N8HTT, K8YSE and VE5ZX for the following DX information.

4U1ITU. Syl, VE5ZX, informs OPDX that G4FNL and himself will be active as 4U1ITU during the CQ World-Wide CW DX Contest, November 23rd and 24th.

9L, SIERRA LEONE. Dave, 9L1US, has gone QRT on November 10th around 0300z. He reports having 5915 QSOs in the CQ WW SSB Contest for a total of 9.4 million points. He will travel back to the states before leaving for his new assignment in Botswana around April 1st (no foolin!). His new callsign might be A22US. QSL his operation to WA8JOC.

9K0, KUWAIT (Special Event Stations). On November 6th, several stations signing 9K0 in the prefix became active. The 9K0 prefix commemorates the extinguishing of all 727 well fires in Kuwait. Work three different

9K0's by November 10th and you will qualify for an exotic Commemorative Award. A special QSL card will also be issued. All 9K0 QSLs and award applications go to 9K2RA.

FR/J, JUAN DE NOVA. Yoland, FR5AI, is now active as FR5AI/J. He was heard Nov. 7th, on 21310 at 1715z. This was a list operation. His length of stay is unknown at this time.

J6, ST. LUCIA. The members and friends of the Southwest Ohio DX Assn. will be active from J6-land November 19th and will go QRT on December 2nd. The list of operators are: WA2USA, KB6ZBI/J6LNN, N6UOM/J6LNO, N8BJQ/J6LRW,

W8FN, W8ILC/J6LRU, W8OK/J6LSD, W8PR/J6LRR, W8QID/J6LNLJ, WB8ENR/J6LRY, WD8IXE/J6LRX, K9BQL/J6LNM, N9AG/J6LSC, AC0S/J6LNL, J6LNLK and K0IYF. This same group will be active during the CQ WW CW Contest as J6DX. The J6DX call will only be used during the contest. The operators will be active before and after the contest on CW, SSB and RTTY. Listen for J6LNLJ, J6LRR and J6LSC on the WARC bands. Also, J6LRY, J6LNN and J6LSC, will be active on RTTY. QSL's for the individual ops should go to their respective U.S. CallBook address. QSL's for J6DX are via N9AG.

Special Note: The callsign structure in St. Lucia is undergoing a change at the end of the year. Novices will be issued a J66 callsign, visitors will be issued a J67 callsign and fully licensed nationals will be issued a J69 callsign.

KH7, KURE ISLAND. KH6JEB was heard to say he will be on KH7 around Christmas time.

P5, NORTH KOREA. P5RR continues to be active and using the same QSL route as Romeo, UB5JRR. According to UZ4FWD, he knows of no Russian operator that is operating there. Also, someone from the Southeastern Cluster Group received a FAX this week from Toly, UT3UY. The Fax indicated that Romeo was in Toly's shack and heard the operation of P5RR. (The P5RR operation is definitely pirate.)

S2, BANGLADESH. As this bulletin was being written, there is still no activity from S2. There is no word on whether S21A has received the equipment from INDEXA yet and Jim, VK9NS, is still in Bangladesh waiting to activate S21ZA. His wife Kirsti has left for Australia and the word going around has Jim leaving November 20th. There will not be activity from any foreigner until Jim, S21A, president of the Bangladesh Amateur Radio Society (BARS) operates first. Also, Eric, WZ6C, is in Bangladesh waiting to receive his license and has been active with the BARS to help cultivate and expand amateur operations. If Jim, VK9NS, runs out of time to operate, do not worry. Eric, WZ6C, will be there in S2-land for approximately 2 years on business. Hopefully Eric and the S2 nationals will provide ample S2 contacts.

YA, AFGHANISTAN. Pavel, OK1IAI, is now in Kabul and is operating as OK1IAI/YA. Reports show he has been active on 28037 kHz around 1200 to 1330z operating CW. It was mentioned, Pavel, will be there for 2 years. This is one of the stations you "Work First and Worry Later" (FWWL).

There still is no word from Jacky, F2CW, who is supposed to be signing YA2CW. Also, there are reports of the possibility of some OK-land ops to activate YA-land.

YL DXPEDITION. The following YLs will be active November 11-18 from British Virgin Island and signing VP2V/HOMECALL: Nellie/XE1CI, FLO/KU7F, Mary Lou/NM7N, N4DDK/Alice and Elizabeth/VE7YL. From VP2V they will travel to Grenda on November 18-26, were their calls are pending. They will be active 10-40 meters including the WARC bands on the following modes: CW, SSB, RTTY. They will also be active in the CQ WW CW Contest as single-op, multi-op.

YX5LA, LAS AVES ISLAND. A station operating as YX5LA has caused some confusion. This is an IOTA DXpedition to S.A. 051. YX5LA is located on the island of Las Aves, which is north of Venezuela and east of Bonaire. It counts as credit for Venezuela at the DXCC Desk, not YV0 Aves (Bird Island) which counts as a separate country from Venezuela.

ZL8, KERMADEC ISLANDS. Mike, K4ADK, President of the North Alabama DX Club, asked OPDX to pass along the following information. Ron, ZL1AMO, is set to go to Kermadec in March of 1992. This DXpedition will cost about \$20,000. His transportation is booked and his equipment is secured.
